Backyard Birds Safari

Materials

- 2 toilet paper rolls
- String
- Hole punch
- Decorating supplies (crayons, paint, stickers)
- Glue or stapler

Instructions

- 1. Decorate the toilet paper rolls.
- 2. Staple or glue the rolls together lengthwise.
- 3. Hole punch the sides of binoculars near the top.
- 4. Tie string through the holes.
- 5. Use your binoculars to try and find the common Kansan birds below.



American Robin

Description: 9-11 inches long, black or gray head and body, reddish-orange underbelly Habitat: grassy and wooded areas
Diet: insects, worms, & worms



Red-winged Blackbird

Description: black body with red and yellow patch on wing (male), all brown body (female)
Habitat: marshes, wetlands, open fields
Diet: insects, seeds, spiders
Call: chortle-dee; tseer





Canada Goose

Description: 30-45inches long, black head and neck, white "chinstrap", brown body
Habitat: Lakes, ponds, marshes, fields
Diet: grass, aquatics plants, sedges, berries



Common Grackle

Description: 11-13 inches long, blackish body with iridescence of purples, blues, and greens Habitat: open and semi-open area
Diet: insects, berries, seeds, frogs, minnows Call: a variety of croaks, whistles, and squeaks



European Starling

Description: 8 inches longs, iridescent black

with white specks

Habitat: open areas, disturbed habitat

Diet: insects, berries, seeds
 Call: breathy wolf-whistle



Mourning Dove

Description: 12 inches long; brown gray with a black speck on cheek, darker wings

Habitat: open and semi open areas;

Diet: seeds

Call: hooo-ah hoo-hoo-hoo



Northern Cardinal

Description: 8-9 inches long, red with a black face (males), brown with some red (female); crest on head

Habitat: woodlands edges, bushy/semi-open

areas
Diet: seeds, grain, berries, insects

Call: per-cheer-cheer-cheer





House Sparrow

Description: 6-7 inches long; gray and brown (male), brown and yellowish brown (female)
Habitat: disrupted areas, urban areas
Diet: seeds, crumbs from humans

Call: chiddik, chiddik
